## CRIME VICTIMS' SUPPORT OFFICES

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## WHAT ARE CRIME VICTIMS' SUPPORT OFFICES

Crime Victims' Support Offices are a free public service created by Law 35/1995, of 11 December, on aid and assistance to victims of violent crimes and crimes against sexual freedom and subsequently regulated by Law 4/2015, of 27 April, of the Statute of the Crime Victim and, in particular, by Royal Decree 1109/2015, of 11 December, implementing Law 4/2015, of 27 April on the Statute of the Crime Victim and regulating the Crime Victims' Support Offices, together with the Ministerial Order PJC/1/2024, 2 January, by which this Office is established as an administrative unit within the Ministry.

The Offices under the Ministry of the Presidency, Justice and Relations with Parliament are located in those autonomous communities and autonomous cities with powers not transferred within the scope of the Justice Administration: Castile and Leon, Castile-La Mancha, Extremadura, Region of Murcia, Illes Balears, Ceuta and Melilla.

Crime Victims' Support Offices are staffed by civil servants of the Justice Administration (procedural and administrative managers) and psychology professionals.

## WHO CAN BE SUPPORTED BY THESE OFFICES

Crime Victims' Support Offices provide support and assistance to all types of victims of crime, serving people who have been victims, among others, of violent crimes resulting in death, serious injury or damage to physical or mental health, as well as victims of crimes against sexual freedom, whether direct or indirect victims. In any case, the support and assistance in these Offices will never be conditioned on the previous filing of a complaint.

The Offices often provide assistance to victims of gender violence, domestic violence, sexual violence, offences related to road accidents and robbery with violence, among many other crimes.

## WHAT DO CRIME VICTIMS' SUPPORT OFFICES OFFER

- Information to victims, direct or indirect, in accessible language about their rights and how to exercise them in order to avoid a lack of protection after the crime.
- Information for victims on the procedure for filing a criminal

complaint, where to file it, guidance on its content and form, as well as its processing in court.

- Information on access to legal aid and assistance in applying for it.
- Information on the state of the proceedings affecting the victims.
- Accompanying the victim throughout the process, to the trial if necessary and/or to the different criminal courts.
- Information on the economic aid that may correspond to them as a consequence of the crime and the procedure for claiming it, as well as support in its processing by the Directorate General for Social Security Regulations.
- Emotional support to victims and therapeutic assistance to victims who need it, throughout the judicial procedure, including psychological intervention in crisis situations and guaranteeing adequate psychological assistance to overcome the traumatic consequences of the crime.
- Assessment and counselling on the needs of the victim and how to prevent and avoid the consequences of primary, repeated and secondary victimisation, intimidation and retaliation.
- Conduct initial intake interviews aimed at detecting and assessing the needs of victims, in the context of their individualised assessment.
- Carrying out follow-up contacts by phone or any other digital support, in all cases deemed necessary and convenient by the office staff.
- Drawing up a psychological support plan for vulnerable victims and in cases where the protection order is applied.
- Information on available specialised services that can assist the victims, in view of their personal circumstances and the nature of the crime to which they may have been subjected.
- Referring the victim, where necessary, to other entities or associations dealing with the care of specific victims, including social resources, as well as monitoring them.
- Collaboration and coordination with the bodies, institutions and services that may be involved in victim assistance: judiciary, public prosecutor's office, law enforcement agencies, social services, health services, associations and non-profit organisations, in particular in cases of vulnerable victims with a high risk of victimisation.
- Assessment of victims in need of special protection measures in order to establish which protection, assistance and support measures should be provided.

- Orientation to the victim on existing social resources and facilitating access to them, through referral if appropriate.

## WHAT IS THE AIM OF CRIME VICTIMS' SUPPORT OFFICES

- The general legal orientation of the victim to avoid secondary victimization, given that the orientation and legal counselling of the specific case is the responsibility of the person who assumes the legal aid.
- Psychological support to victims.
- Referral to the social resources they need.

## HOW DO THE CRIME VICTIMS' SUPPORT OFFICES PERFORM

The model of action of the Offices is implemented through different stages: reception-guidance, information, intervention and follow-up.

The stages involve a general orientation of the victims, specific legal information throughout the criminal proceedings, support in the necessary interventions and follow-up throughout the criminal proceedings, as well as psychological intervention programs for all types of crime victims such as victims of gender violence and domestic violence, among other vulnerable victims.
